CERTIFICATION OF SCHOOL

The Monterey Peninsula College Peace Officer Academy and its basic course were reviewed and recommended for approval by the Executive Officer. Motion by Commissioner McDonnell, seconded by Commissioner McCann, carried unanimously that the Monterey Peninsula College Peace Officer Academy be certified as of September 1, 1963.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Code of Ethics

A general discussion followed in which all Commissioners participated. The discussion was whether or not the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics should be included as Section 1011 of the Proposed Changes of the Rules and Regulations.

By request of the Chair, the Code of Ethics was read by the Executive Officer. Motion by Brereton, seconded by Commissioner Cottar, motion carried, that the Code of Ethics would be included in the Proposed Changes of the Rules and Regulations as Section 1011.

SUPERVISORY COURSE

The following proposed Specification of the Supervisory Course was presented to the Commissioners for evaluation:

PROPOSED SPECIFICATION

Subject: THE SUPERVISORY COURSE

In accordance with Section 1005 (b) of the Rules and Regulations, the supervisory course consists of a minimum of 80 classroom hours and shall include the subjects and minimum classroom hours set forth as follows:

I. ELEMENTS OF SUPERVISION 50 HOURS

1. Introduction and Scope of the Course
2. Selection of Supervisors
3. Duties and Responsibilities of the Police Supervisor
4. The Supervisor's Relationship to Police Management
5. Communication Principles
6. Handling and Preventing Complaints
7. Motivating Men to Work
8. Leadership
9. Psychological Aspects of Supervision
10. Morale and Discipline
11. Performance Appraisal and Rating Procedures
12. Making Duty Assignments
13. Written Examinations

II. THE SUPERVISORY TRAINING FUNCTION 30 HOURS

1. The Supervisory Training Function
2. How People Learn
3. Job Analysis
4. The Four Steps of Teaching
5. Lesson Plans
6. Audio-Visual Aids
7. Instruction Sheets
8. Practical Application
9. Evaluation of Instruction
10. Written Examinations

The proposed Supervisory Course was discussed in detail by all Commissioners and some of the visitors. Chairman Andersen's letter was read which suggested the following titles for Section II of the course:

1. Elements of Learning
2. Elements of Training
3. Principles of Instruction

Motion by Ficklin, seconded by McDonnell, carried unanimously, that the above outlined Supervisory Course be adopted with an amendment that Section II be titled "Techniques of Teaching".

HEARING LOCATIONS AND DATES

It was pointed out by the Executive Officer that it might be possible to phase in the Supervisory Course as of January 1, 1964; consequently, hearing dates should be set. Motion by Ficklin, seconded by Seares, that the first hearing be held in Sacramento on November 6, 1963 and the second hearing be held in Los Angeles on November 13, 1963. Motion carried unanimously.

For the purpose of reviewing the results of the hearings, and preparing the final regulation changes, it was moved by Seares, seconded by McDonnell and unanimously carried, that a Commission meeting be held November 26, 1963 at 10 a.m. in Los Angeles .

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned by the Vice Chairman at 11:55 a.m.
